British Sprint and Middle Distance Championships

Good luck to all the Club members making the trip across the water to Northern Ireland for the British Championships at the weekend.



Saturday sees the Sprint Championships take place in Armagh, which looks to be a very attractive city. The terrain description covers everything - urban streets, campus, parkland and open grassland. Hilly in parts, with concrete, tarmac, grass and woodland - choice of footwear could be very important, especially if it



rains!

Sunday is the middle distance race in Drumkeeragh Forest, which is described as a small but varied and challenging forest; combining a mix of densely planted pine forest with poor visibility and more mature open areas which provide good running.

World Cup Orienteering Round 1



The 2023 Orienteering World Cup consists of ten races divided over the World Cup rounds. Round 1 consisted of a Long distance race, Middle distance race and relay - all set in the technical forest of Ostfold in Norway. As you would expect from a World Cup event, the area provided both serious physical and navigational challenges, and the Scandinavians and the Swiss were dominant. In the men's races Norwegian Kasper Fosser took the win in both the Long and the Middle. Astonishingly, in the Long, after running a course of 15km, his



winning margin was only 3 seconds. In the Middle, he took a much more comfortable win with a margin of

16 seconds! In the women's races Sweden were dominant. On the 12km Long course, experienced Tove Alexandersson took the win from her compatriot, with a winning margin of just under a minute, but on the Middle the roles were reversed with her team-mate, Sara Hagstrom taking the win by 10 seconds. (There were 6 Swedish runners in the top ten!).

Best of the Brits were Megan Carter-Davies and Ralph Street. Meg ran consistently to finish in the top 20 in both the Long and Middle races, managing 17th in the Long and 15th in the Middle. Ralph was 27th in the Long and 34th in the Middle. WCOC members Niamh Hunter and Alastair Thomas were the youngest members of the GB squad and it was Niamh's first senior competition for GB. It is fair to say that Niamh did not have a great Long run. She lacked energy which was not good on the tough terrain, but she was pleased to get around. She enjoyed her Middle race far more and the GPS tracking showed that she had no major navigational issues. She joined 4 other British women who all finished around the 48-min mark, which was a big improvement from the Long.

Unfortunately for Alastair, it wasn't meant to be. He struggled for pace on the Long race, and after a good strong start in the Middle, at one point registering the fastest time to the first TV control, a navigational error on the long leg dropped him

down the standings.

In the relays, perhaps unsurprisingly, Sweden took the win in the women's race, but only with a winning margin of 12 seconds over the Swiss team. In the men's relay Ukraine were leading after the 1st leg, but again Sweden were just too good, taking the win from Finland, again by 12 seconds.



In the men's relay- GB1 came a creditable 19th, after a good run from Ralph Street on leg 3. GB2 were well down after the first leg handover to Alastair but Al ran well, catching up 3 places which is no mean feat at this level, and the team ended up 35th.



In the women's race, a poor first leg for GB1 meant that at the 1st handover, GB2 were ahead of GB1. Niamh on 2nd leg for GB2 ran a reasonable leg but dropped a few places, but managed to stay ahead of the GB1 Team at the handover, however with Megan Carter-Davies running final leg for GB1, they caught and overtook the GB2 team, leaving the two GB women's teams to finish 67th and 68th respectively. It will have been great experience gained for Niamh and AI, and brilliant to see their hard work and commitment paying off.
