<u>JIRCs</u>

This weekend saw the Junior Inter-Regional Championships take place in South Wales. The competition brings together all the English junior regional orienteering squads, Wales, Northern Ireland and Scotland to compete in the individual event on the Saturday and the relays on Sunday.

Lots of WCOC juniors were competing for the North-West Junior Squad, namely, Lily, Sophie, Myrtle, Eva, Toby, Isaac, George, Emma, Issy, Daisy and Dan. It was great to see Emma and Issy making the long trip from Edinburgh University to support the squad.



The individual event took place at Kenfig Burrows, described as an area of complex sand dunes, with runnable wooded areas and seasonal marshes. (Map opposite).

On the Saturday, Isaac had a strong run on M16, taking 2nd place behind the Scottish squad, Toby was 15th, and George 24th. On M18 Dan was 8th. On W14, Lily was 10th, and on W16 Mrytle was 13th, Eva was 15th and Sophie was 21st. On W18 Laura Brown from LOC took the win for NWOA, Emma was 4th, Daisy 7th and Issy was 12th.

After day 1, NWOA was lying in 4th place behind, Scotland, Yorkshire and the South-West.

On Sunday the action turned to the relay event at Llantrisant Forest, a steep working forest, with many pits, knolls, and charcoal burning platforms - a challenging relay area!

Due to the age and availability of runners, some of the squad ran in an ad hoc team. In the men's competition there were solid runs, with the 3 NWOA teams finishing in 12th, 14th and 16th. In the women's competition, the NW team which included Mrytle and Lily took 4th, after a storming run

from Laura Brown on last leg. Overall both men's and women's teams finished 5th overall in the relays which was also the overall finishing position for the NWOA, behind Scotland 1st, Yorkshire 2nd, South-West 3rd and South-East 4th.

Well done to all the squad runners for giving it your all and for achieving a very creditable 5th place.



And a very special thanks to Lynne Thomas for all the advance organising, captaining and driving (800 miles round trip; 15 hours, 2 minibuses), along with the other drivers/supporters, Janette, Simon and Scott. The geographical location of the events necessitated a Friday evening departure with 2 nights spent sleeping on hall floors, and 7am starts both days. It was a great experience for the

juniors taking part which wouldn't be possible without the help and commitment of the adult helpers. A great team effort!
